The Village Development Programme continues under the chairmanship of Vice Chairman, Patrick Gallagher, although we are a little behind schedule, due in the main, to the bureaucratic processes we all experience when dealing with public administration. Nonetheless, we will be seeking final membership approval for the financial model before mid-year so early 2023 should see commencement of construction.

Our Scholarship Committee chaired by Legatee Jenni Bourchier has worked hard interviewing and assessing some 10 scholarship applicants recently. The Committee selected six Awardees: four for university level scholarships and two for TAFE scholarships. Our Scholarship Programme is one of the most exciting initiatives of BWLC. We now have some 11 students who are benefiting from his Programme. All of course are descendants of Veterans.

It may be of interest for everyone to know that since Jan 2021, 5 new Legatees have joined us and several more are in the process of being inducted. The exciting thing about this is that the interest in Legacy and what we do is still alive and well 'out there'. I would again like to add my welcome to all those who have joined us

Service Memories – The Boy from Deniliquin

As we approach the National Day of Remembrance one of our Legacy beneficiaries Gladys would like to pay tribute to her beloved husband Albert.

Prior to WW2 Albert had worked at Australia's oldest Merino stud; Caroonboon Station in the Riverina Region of NSW near the Victorian border, owned by "The Dickson family".

Gladys grew up in the town of Bellbird in the Hunter region, however, in the 1960's she would move 905kms to the town of Deniliquin. Gladys found work with Stuart and Anne McKellar at the iconic Boonooke Merino operation near Deniliquin "Zara" as their cook.

During her time in Deniliquin Gladys cooked for the Jackaroos at Boonooke, met and married Albert and also became the President of the Deniliquin Women's Auxiliary.

The Women's auxiliary decided to interview returned servicemen, documenting their stories into a book titled "Service Memories".

This was Albert's story...

I was originally in the 17th Machine Gun Militia at

Balcombe. I joined the A.I.F in 1940 and trained at Balcombe Victoria and was then sent to Dandenong for more training. I then went to Melbourne Technical School turning and fitting in small arms.

I joined the 20th Battalion, 3rd Armoured Division and travelled by train to Sydney for more drilling. We were then transported to Chirmside, Queensland for Armoury Mechanical training.

At one stage my mates and I considered joining the R.A.A.F because all we seemed to do was march and drill, march and drill. We thought anything would be better than this. (We had a lot to learn)

Whilst training at Tamworth we had to cross the river with full packs. We lost a lot of blokes, and they dragged the river with barbed wire to find their bodies.

After jungle training on the Atherton Tablelands, Queensland we embarked on HMAS Duntroon, destination New Guinea.

We spent 3 years in the islands at Lae, Wewak and Bougainville, driving and training all types of vehicles, including carriers. We also did the usual patrols and guard duties as the Japs were very close and we had to keep them from getting the vehicles.

I will never forget the rain- every afternoon in rolled the storm clouds and then a bang of thunder that was louder than the guns going off around us, and down would come the rain.

One day while on patrol in the jungle something happened that changed our attitude. We passed the body of a Jap soldier and the boys commented. The poor bloke, he's copped it. As the last man passed the Jap, miraculously came alive and shot our mate. We all turned our guns on the Jap. Moral: NEVER ASSUME.

After the surrender we were given the task of guarding the P.O.W's and collecting their guns.

We were sent home by ship to Cairns, but on the way, we lost a couple of men with Malaria (they were buried at sea). We were quarantined. Finally, I was on the train heading south for Melbourne and then on to Deniliquin where I had to walk 18 miles to Smeaton Vale.

During my time as a driver, I was most fortunate to have driven Gracie Fields (singer) and Bertie Oldfield (cricketer) to many venues where they entertained the troops.

I also drove for General Tom Blamey when he was touring the country. His wife Olga was a kind lady who would send jugs of lemon squash out to me. Looking back, I would say there was a distinct taste to it.

Prior to being discharged in 1947 I completed my turner & fitter and mechanics certificate at Footscray & Collingwood Technical Schools.



THE GRIBBLE FAMILY

Recently I got in touch with an old family friend of mine, Phil Gribble, to ask him some questions regarding boating on the Central Coast. Phil was recommended to me by a friend who said he was a very experienced boating enthusiast and would be able to help me.

When I was younger, I remembered Phil's father Stephen very well, he was a Legatee with my father Peter Ferry. Stephen was a great family man and he left a very deep impression with me.

When I met up with Phil the whole story regarding his family and Brisbane Water Legacy came back and it is a very interesting story, touched with sadness. I asked Phil to put together a family history and this is what he wrote:

"Stephen Hope Gribble was born on March 5, 1916 in Pretoria South Africa to Australian parents who were working there as mill managers. Not long after, the family which included twin brother Bill (William), older brother Tom (Thomas) and their parents returned to live in Australia.

After growing up in various regional NSW areas, Steve settled in Canberra and worked as a mercer for Snows Menswear. He married my mother Joyce (nee Phillips) and joined the Australian Army in his early 20s.

Steve served with distinction in the Middle East during the Second world war although I don't ever remember him talking much about his war service.

Joyce and Steve became parents to three children Bronwyn (17 May, 1947), Phillip (12 August, 1949) and Robert (25 June, 1951), all of whom were born in Canberra ACT.

In 1952, Steve set out to fulfil his dream of establishing his own menswear business by moving his young family to The Entrance, then only a small holiday destination on the NSW Central Coast. Steve and Joyce built two shops at numbers 64 and 66 The Entrance Road and lived in a small flat above the shops.

They worked hard to establish their "Gribble's Menswear" business and became staunch members of the small community through their involvement with The Entrance Public School P and C, the Methodist (now Uniting) Church and The Entrance RSL.

Steve became a Legatee at Brisbane Water Legacy Gosford in the early 1950s along with other local businessmen including (if my memory serves me correctly) Peter Ferry, Bill Johnston. Errol Hickey, Doug Fagan, Reg Eddy, Sid Noble and Ted Humphries.

Just as life seemed to be perfect for the young family, tragedy struck on October 8, 1959 when Steve died unexpectedly from a heart attack. Left with three young children aged 12, 10 and 8 and an elderly mother who was living with them at the time, Joyce stoically battled on to make a life for them.

In 1961, Joyce made the decision to sell the business and The Entrance property and move her family to White Street, East Gosford. She enrolled the children in Brisbane Water Legacy as Legacy Wards and undertook whatever work was available to her to "make ends meet" as she used to say. The children completed their high school educations at Gosford High School. Bronwyn studied at Newcastle Teachers College to become a Primary School Teacher, Phillip undertook the Valuation of Real Estate course at Sydney Technical College which led to a successful career as a Real Estate Valuer with the Commonwealth Government and Robert completed his apprenticeship as a Panel Beater whilst working at Noble Holden at West Gosford, later joining Gosford Council to work as a water services operator for almost 40 years.

Bronwyn, Phillip and Robert were all married in the Gosford Uniting Church and all settled in the local district. Bronwyn (married to Harry for 53 years) lives at Erina and has 3 children and 6 grandchildren, all of whom live on the Central Coast, Phillip (married to Margaret for 51 years) lives at East Gosford and has 2 children and 4 grandchildren all of whom live on the Central Coast), and Robert (married to Robyn for 49 years) lives at Green Point and has 2 children and 4 grandchildren all of whom live on the Central Coast.

I am proud of the legacy which my parents have left (Joyce passed away in 2000 at the age of 83). Family was everything to them and the quality of their parenting and the standards they set for us have resulted in the close knit families we are today."

Several weeks ago, Phil took me out onto the Brisbane Water in a small runabout. It was a perfect day and we enjoyed motoring around the beautiful Brisbane Water. I was amazed at Phil's boating skills and local historical knowledge of the Brisbane Water.

After talking to Phil, I asked him where he got his original interest in sailing and boating. He told me he originally joined the Gosford Sailing Club (GSC) as a junior member in 1963. He then progressed through the dinghy sailing ranks, competing in several classes including Sabots, VJ's, Skates, 16 foot skiffs, NS14s and MG14s.

Phil was elected to the GSC Board in the late 1980's and served as Commodore from 1993 to 1997. Phil was awarded Life Membership in the late 1990's and went on to train as a Sailing Instructor in 1998 becoming the inaugural Sailing Administrator of the GSC.

Phil then managed several more important programs for the GSC before retiring from GSC duties around 2006.

You can see I was in 'very good hands' with Phil boating around the Brisbane Water.

The other important point is Phil's early family relationship with Brisbane Water Legacy. This relationship helped his family immensely after the sudden death of his father Legatee Stephen Hope Gribble, WWII Veteran.

In August was accepted as a Legatee, appointed to the Board and elected as vice president for 2021/2022. He is also chair village redevelopment committee and a member of the finance committee.




Ernie Eves, OA - Mar 2021




Book Review

44 Days - Michael Veitch

Early one evening in May 1942, nine dishevelled young men, barely recognisable as fighter pilots by the filthy remnants of uniform that hung off their jaundiced and emaciated frames, gathered under a canvas army tent to be addressed by their newly appointed Commanding Officer. The previous CO, who was the brother to the new CO, had been killed a few days earlier in a futile air fight between a Japanese Zero and his Kittyhawk. The young pilots were devastated by his loss. The only thing that numbed their grief was the permanent haze of sickness and exhaustion that clung to them.

The previous 44 days were spent at Seven Mile Strip on

of Port Moresby. The 75 Squadron formed barely two months earlier were the first fighter squadron to be raised and flown in the direct defence of Australia. Twenty or so young pilots, barely trained men iust out of flying school were rushed into combat.



They were a mixed lot, among them a Queensland country teacher, a carpet salesman from Melbourne, an aspiring Sydney radio announcer and a quiet accountant from Launceston. In appalling conditions and suffering from malaria and gastroenteritis they fought the finest of Japan's pilots daily. At the end of their 44 day battle 18 Zero fighters and Betty bombers lay in burnt-out pieces, with 33 'probables' and 30 destroyed or severely damaged on the ground. Australia lost 12 pilots and 15 Kittyhawks.

The new CO informed the remaining nine pilots that the Japanese naval invasion force was on its way, headed for Port Moresby. Pilots were needed to take off the following morning to try and stop it.

The men listened, the whole thing sounded like a suicide mission, yet every one of them stepped forward.

TELEMARKETERS AND SCAMS

Lately it seems like every second or third phone call we get is a Telemarketer or a Scam. Sometimes, It'll be a robot voice on the line telling you you have a debt or that you owe money to a government agency. Other times, the phone will hang up after one ring, presumably to get you to call back.

Scams cost Australian consumers, businesses, and the economy hundreds of millions of dollars each year and cause serious emotional harm to victims and their families.

In 2020 Australians made more than 216,000 reports to Scamwatch and reported losses of around \$178 million. Scamwatch received more than 226,000 reports with reported losses of over \$222 million.

Even if you're registered with DO NOT CALL ph 1300 792958, and though it IS great at reducing unwanted telemarketing, it doesn't stop scammers.

The Do Not Call register is a free service managed by ACMA, the Australian Communications and Media Authority. Telemarketers are required to check numbers against the register before they call, and you should notice a reduction in calls after about 30 days. It protects you from unwanted telemarketing calls. It puts to bed all the legal telemarketers. You won't get the energy calls, or the telco calls or the finance calls — the cold calling that is legal but can be annoying.

If your number is on the register, and you do get a telemarketing call, you can report it to ACMA on 1300 850115. Remember though, the register won't stop all marketing calls, as some organisations and callers are exempt. The exemptions cover: Registered charities,

Educational institutions, Government bodies, Registered political parties, Social researchers and option pollsters.

And what about Scams? As you may have guessed by now, blocking scam calls is much harder.

Scammers often call from numbers that appear to be legitimate. Spoofing of numbers tends to be a very common tactic. The scammers will make their number look as though it's an Australian landline or mobile number, even though the number they're calling from might be in the subcontinent.

While you can't stop the calls, you can protect yourself. While it might be tempting to set a trap for a scammer, the best thing to do is to simply ignore the calls.

If someone's entertained the scammer, you will often find that there is a relationship between doing that and more calls.

Keep in mind that scammers are usually after personal information or your money. Broadly speaking, avoiding scam calls is about not taking unsolicited calls, not giving any personal information away and not being pushed or pressured into doing that.

If scammers do get through, they can be very intense about what they're saying. It's important also to not rely on caller ID (meaning the number that shows up on your phone) as it can be spoofed.

Besides that, you can try blocking numbers, or reporting them to ScamWatch. Often though, scammers will simply move to another number. Sadly there is no quick fix and with these calls ever on the rise, it's a matter of "when, not if" it happens. Please be careful.

An advanced group will run for those with higher baseline fitness and some experience with strength and balance training.


