It was also a significant moment for us, as it marked the first time we felt truly acknowledged by the Department after my father's many years of service.

Earlier in 2024, I celebrated 15 years of Volunteer Service for the non-profit Look Good Feel Better (LGFB), empowering women during their cancer journey. Leadership Transition in Membership Committee


Thank You Ian McNee

Honouring the Armistice: Laying a Wreath at Kings Park War Memorial on Remembrance Day

At 11:00 am on 11 November 2024, the Kings Park War Memorial in Perth stood as a beacon of remembrance, drawing hundreds together to reflect on the sacrifices made by Australian servicemen and women during World War II and beyond. The annual Remembrance Day ceremony marked the anniversary of the armistice that brought an end to the global devastation of World War I, and its solemnity echoed deeply with all in attendance.

Pigeon Racing and Legacy

Pigeons played a crucial role in both World Wars, delivering messages across long distances, often being the only reliable communication method. Their bravery is honoured today, with pigeons like Cher Ami, who saved 194 soldiers in 1918, remembered for their heroism. Today, pigeon racing is enjoyed worldwide.

In 2014, a group of pigeon flyers combined their love for the sport and their desire to honour Sergeant Todd Langley, a fallen soldier, by starting pigeon auctions to raise funds for Legacy WA. Many pigeon flyers are military veterans or connected to Legacy, and the idea was to support the cause through these auctions.

The first major success came in 2016, when \$25,000 was raised to purchase a bus for the

Legacy WA Busselton Camp. Since then, funds have been used for the bus's upkeep and for prize money in "Legacy Races," which also boost excitement around the auctions. This year, a donation of \$3,944 will be presented to Legacy WA.

Pigeon flyers continue to support Legacy by training pigeons for these races, ensuring the continued success of this fundraising initiative.


Chevron Breakfast

LEGATEE RECIPES

DATE & WALNUT LOAF

Ingredients


1 cup pitted dates coarsely chopped
1/2 Cup brown sugar firmly packed
60g unsalted butter chopped
1 cup boiling water
1 free-range egg beaten
1 3/4 cups of self-raising flour
3/4 walnuts (roughly chopped)
2 tsp cinnamon
1 tsp bicarbonate of soda

PRO TIP:
Spread with butter, toast it,
or do both!

Method

1. Place the dates, bicarbonate of soda, margarine and sugar in a large bowl and pour over the boiling water. Mix to break up the margarine and then set aside until the boiling water has cooled.
2. Meanwhile, line a medium sized loaf tin with greaseproof paper and pre-heat your oven to 170°C (150°C for fan assisted ovens or Gas Mark 3).
3. Once the mixture has cooled, add the egg and walnuts, mixing through to combine. Sift in the flour and mix to create a batter.
4. Transfer the batter to your pre-lined tin and bake in your pre-heated oven for about 1 hour. Keep an eye on your cake toward the end of baking and if you think it's looks done on top, cover with a sheet of tin foil - this will stop the top from burning while the inside continues to bake.
5. Remove from the oven and allow to cool in the tin. Serve straight away or for a better taste, keep the loaf in an air-tight container for a couple of days before serving.





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
